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STRENGTH OF POLES

There was a severe wind storm in Kansas in August 2006. It blew down a two mile stretch of transmission and distribution poles. All the poles broke at the ground line.

An intensive investigation was made and the results were published in Transmission & Distribution World, Volume 59 in May 2007.

I studied this article to see what I could learn.

Remember I have no formal education in engineering but have been around lumber/sawmills/logs/poles and preservatives for the past 66+ years. (I started early). Also, remember a little knowledge is a dangerous thing.

The first point that caught my attention was the statement "for most short poles the maximum stress will normally occur at or below the ground line" and second, "the strength of the pole at a given height is proportional to the cube of the circumference at this height."

When the circumference of the ground line is cubed (circumference times circumference times circumference) and

then compared to the previous class, you find the strength increases approximately 25% with each larger class.

ANSI 05.1—2002 shows basically the same thing. The ground line stress is approximately 25% greater with each larger class when the horizontal load is applied 2 feet from the top of the pole.

This is accurate on the popular sizes. The larger classes don't increase in strength this much. The smaller sizes increase much more than 25%

FOOTBALL

It's about that time. All the fans have high hopes – your team is undefeated!

Many of the employees have different hobbies. The oldest clodhopper at Thomasson Company is still trying to officiate high school football, after 52 years on the field, the crew jokes that they will assign him to the clock.

Here is a test of the rules for high school football. Let's see how much you know about the sport. Answer True or False.

1. When the ball becomes dead in possession of a player, he shall place the ball on the ground or immediately return it to a nearby official.
2. If the head coach has been disqualified, a "new" head coach may not be designated for the purpose of requesting time-out(s).
3. If worn attached to the helmet, an eye shield is illegal unless it is constructed of a molded, rigid material that is clear and permits 100 percent (no tint) allowable light transmission.
4. Batting a fumble in flight is illegal.
5. A forward pass may be battled in any direction by all eligible receivers.
6. Player of the team in possession may bat a ball in player possession forward.
7. It is illegal for B1 to trip runner A1.
8. The ball becomes dead during a try when B1 secures possession or as soon as it is apparent that a kick try is unsuccessful.
9. In a Scrimmage Kick formation, the snapper has special protection only until the ball has clearly been released in a legal snap.
10. If a loose ball touches a game official, who is straddling the sideline, the ball is not out of bounds.
11. Tear-away jerseys may be worn in both coaches agree to use them.
12. The foul for not properly wearing the required equipment during a down carries a penalty of 15 yards.
13. A live-ball foul and a dead-ball foul cannot be combined to create a double foul.
14. Forward pass interference can occur behind, in or beyond the neutral zone.
15. If end A1 accidentally goes out of bounds and returns during the down, he becomes an ineligible pass receiver.
16. Pass eligibility rules apply to both legal and illegal forward passes.
17. The offensive team is limited to one legal forward pass per down.
18. If a foul occurs simultaneously with the snap it is enforced from the succeeding spot.
19. The penalty for an unsportsmanlike foul is enforced from the spot of the foul.
20. If B1 intercepts a forward pass in B's end zone and drops to one knee, it is a safety.
21. Receiver may recover any scrimmage kick anywhere between the goal lines and advance the ball.
22. The snapper may have his free hand on the ground in advance of the ball.
23. An official's time-out can be called for unusual heat or humidity situations.
24. The clock will start with the snap following the enforcement of a "delay of game" penalty.
25. After the ball has been out of bounds, the clock always starts with the ready-for-play.
